

Standing at the edge of a new year is invigorating for some and nerve racking for others. All those months stretching out before us hold many answers to the questions that are found within one year.



THE RELIGIOUS LIFE OF MOUNT ST. BENEDICT

Retreat Program

The greatest focus of energy in the planned spiritual life of Mount St. Benedict College in 1997 has been the Retreat Program. In October 1996, Br Graham Niest, a Marist Brother with extensive experience in school and youth retreat work, spent a morning working with all the teachers who were involved in the 1996 program. Graham had read all our programs and documentation. He provided some theoretical input as well as the opportunity to reflect on our own experience. After lengthy discussions and consultation it was decided to make some rather important changes. In essence these meant:

- each year level (except Year 10) would be divided into groups of 40 45 students going to separate venues;
- a teacher would be asked to facilitate the process at each venue;
- the emphasis would be on providing an opportunity for spiritual awareness and development, with community building being a secondary aim.

Years 7, 8 and 9 have each had a Reflection Day with opportunities for quiet time, praying with various media (paint, clay, writing, drawing) and liturgical prayer. We have used a number of local venues, giving the girls an opportunity to enjoy the beauty and space of a different environment without the constraints of school.

Years 10, 11 and 12 have had longer Retreats with an overnight stay or two nights for Year 12. Change is always difficult for students and many of the senior students were not happy with the proposal but the feedback was very positive indeed. The smaller groups allowed for better use of the facilities, more quiet time, greater sense of community and removed the awkwardness of "managing" 120 - 130 students at once.

Students have written about Year 11 and 12 Retreats elsewhere in the Yearbook. The Retreat Program calls for a great deal of commitment from the entire staff those who go and those who stay behind and carry the burden. About 35 teachers have actually participated. I want to publicly acknowledge their dedication and expertise, their generosity and joyfulness in approaching this challenging work.

I believe we have worked well but it is important not to be complacent. To this end Br Graham Niest will work with us again in December to overview the program.

Liturgies

This year we were pleased to welcome the new bishop of the Broken Bay Diocese, David Walker, to celebrate our Opening Eucharist. A group of dedicated students prepared an excellent liturgy around the theme of Journeying Together.

On Mount St. Benedict Day we also gathered in Eucharist to celebrate our Benedictine Tradition. Each Roll Call group brought forward a symbol of their group as part of the Gathering Rite. A specially scripted dialogue highlighted key aspects of St. Benedict's life and writing, emphasising their application in our school - praying together, serving one another, sharing our lives. Fr David Maguire, parish priest of St Bernadette's, Castle Hill was the celebrant.

Louise Shepherd wrote about the Ash Wednesday liturgy:

This year the Religion Department took a different approach to the Ash Wednesday liturgy. Seniors took on the role of distributing the ashes in a reflective ceremony in each roll call group. Students from different year groups took on the role of reading and all participated in singing. After receiving the ashes, each group received a Project Compassion Box and promised to contribute throughout Lent to the missions. All in all it was a very special and reflective beginning to Lent.

During the following six weeks over \$ 500 was donated to Project Compassion.

On the final day of Term One, we had a Paschal Liturgy to celebrate Jesus' final days, his death and resurrection. In roll call groups the students shared bread in commemoration of Holy Thursday, we read of Jesus' death and resurrection. Each student received a candle prepared by Year 7 students to take home in acknowledgment of this mystery and a reminder of the link between school liturgy and our spiritual life which goes far beyond school.

Of course sacramental liturgies would be impossible without the generosity of the local priests who have come for so many occasions - whole school liturgies, Year 10 RE class liturgies, Reconciliation on the Year 8 Reflection Day, Year 11 Eucharist.

Religious Studies

On a daily basis the Religion Faculty continues the work of Religious Education. We have had a few changes in staff. At the end of 1996 Mrs Chris Lindley and Miss Maureen McCluskie left Mount St. Benedict after a number of years, Mrs Sandra Lang moved fully into English and Mrs Julie Walsh into Science. We were fortunate to employ Mr John Hamey who has a specialist degree in Religious Education. Mrs Carmel Dunn also joined the Religion Faculty. Mrs Trish Macalyk replaced Mrs Joan Marsh in Term Two. The full group of 15 Religious Studies teachers is hardworking and dedicated.


As a faculty we are committed to fortnightly meetings for each year level. This requires commitment, but it means we can work together on developing programs and a wide variety of classroom resources. Years 9 and 11 students were fortunate to have excursions. Year 11 visited The Great Synagogue, St Andrew's Anglican Cathedral and the Baha'I Temple, as part of their foundation studies in the meaning and place of religion in society. Year 9 visited the Mary MacKillop Museum and either St Mary's Cathedral or the Good Samaritan Sisters Archives and Congregational Centre, as part of their unit on Australian Church History.

This year all Year 11 students are enrolled in Studies of Religion, a Board endorsed course. This means they can claim credit for this subject in their TER. They are enjoying the challenge of the course and have been encouraged to think about their own beliefs.

With the White Paper of the McGaw Report "Securing Their Future", there will be changes to the way Religious Studies is delivered from 2000. We will need to consider the most appropriate course of studies for all students at Mount St. Benedict.

At faculty meetings we have been considering the AIMS of Religious Studies in the school curriculum. We have considered the aims of the three dioceses from which our students come, and our own experience and education. Once we have completed this task we can continue the ongoing evaluation of our outcomes and programs.

As we come to the end of the year let us thank God and each other for all that has been, and ask a blessing on our undertakings for 1998.





ENGLISH REPORT

English has always been an area in which students at Mount St. Benedict have excelled and clearly the tradition continues to be upheld.

In the 1996 HSC the Means of all English Courses were well above the State Means: 3 Unit students attained a mean of 43%, 2% above the State Mean, 2 Unit Related - 81%, 2 Unit General - 68% and 2 Unit Contemporary - 77%.

Our English grades in the School Certificate were also pleasing with 59% of students receiving either an A or B and 37% gained a C.

All students in Years 7 to 10 competed in this year's Australian Schools' English Competition. Emma Howcroft in Year 7 and Therese Kenny in Year 9 attained High Distinctions. 37 Certificates of Distinction and 91 Certificates of Credit were awarded.

Students from the College submitted entries for the Sydney Morning Herald Young Writer of the Year Competition. Once again, we had one of the highest number of students highly commended for their stories. Congratulations to the following students: Megan Bate, Jennifer Barrett, Katherine Dempsey, Pru Engel, Emma Hogan, Laura Jack, Amie Kirsten, Linda Popic, Dana Stewart. Frances Hanna was a North Sydney Regional Winner. This is the first time a student from our college has been so successful in this competition. Frances was also Very Highly Commended in this year's National Poetry Competition organised by the Dorothy Mackellar Memorial Society. This means her poem, Obituary to Mystery, was in the final selection from which the National and Sectional winners were determined. Sarak-Kate Makila was Highly Commended and Rebecca Griffin, Erin Martin and Janelle Rees were Commended.

Classes in Years 7, 8 and 9 had double English periods once a cycle so that we could have performances by companies as varied as performance poets, storytellers and performing street artists. At the end of Term 2 we celebrated Shakespeare's writing with performances by The Troubadours who explored Shakespeare's Supernatural-The Tempest, A Midsummer Night's Dream, Hamlet and Something Wicked - Macbeth. Year 7 enjoyed seeing Sadako and the Thousand Paper Cranes and Year 9 students attended a performance of A Midsummer Night's

Dream as part of the Festival of the Dreaming, which was performed by an all Aboriginal cast. Senior students have attended performances of Pygmalion, Hamlet, Rosencrantz and Guildenstern are Dead and Educating Rita.

It has been a busy year with lots of exciting activities one note-worthy example was when the convent chapel, filled with atmospheric organ music, courtesy of Mr Jackson, was the setting for Mrs Smith's Year 9 class when they dramatically read obituaries created as a result of studying the film *Dead Poets' Society*.

Students and teachers alike have enjoyed exploring texts and attending performances this year and we look forward to another great year in 1998.

MATHEMATICS REPORT

The time has come for the 1997 Year Book report! This year has passed so quickly, that in some ways it still seems like first term.

In 1997, we have welcomed Mrs Lennox into some of our mathematics classes. Mr Davis is taking long service leave during fourth term. His Years 7 and 8 Mathematics classes will be taught by Mrs McDermott during his absence.

The new mathematics syllabuses for Years 9 and 10 have at last been introduced. We are implementing the changes in three courses - Advanced, Intermediate and Standard.

During first semester, each girl in Years 7, 8 and 9 completed a maths project. These projects formed the base for our Open Day display. Many of these, together with assignments completed by senior students as part of their assessment in Mathematics in Society and Mathematics in Practice, were displayed in rooms 12 and 13. At the end of July, *Westpac* and *Bennie*'s Mathematics competitions were held. On this day, every student in the school participated in a Mathematics competition. Unfortunately, the results have not yet been received.

During this year, senior classes have used the graphing calculators in the classroom. This resource has been used for curve sketching and in trigonometry. It is hoped that their use will be extended next year. Students in the junior school continue to use the Task Centre and other group problem solving activities.

As 1997 draws to a close, we look to 1998 with its challenges and opportunities.





What's big, crunchy and delicious? - Pretzels!



The programme aims to encourage a love of literature by providing selected fiction at varying levels of reading competence.


Parental involvement is essential, as home supervision determines that students receive awards for the number of books they have read through RIB-IT.



YEAR 9 and 10 GEOGRAPHY EXCURSION







DANCE ENSEMBLE



ENVIRONMENT CLUB



1997 has been another busy year. We have continued with all recycling activities and added several new ones. At the end of last year our group was runner up in the Hornsby Council Environmental Awards for schools.

We also won the award for the most innovative programs. Early in the year our Streamwatch group was awarded \$400 by Hornsby Council for the contribution to Streamwatch. This enabled us to purchase extra equipment and replace chemicals. Before Easter we sold 2400 chocolate Easter bilbies as an alternative to the rabbit. With these funds we purchased \$500 shares in Earth Sanctuaries Ltd., a number of wild life parks which breed endangered species.

Our worm farms have worked very productively. "Worm Wee" raised over \$200 this year and now we have a unique label for our containers.

Planting has continued with Greening Australia and the Hawkesbury-Nepean Trust. At present we have 500 eucalypt and acacia trees growing. These will be planted on the banks of the Hawkesbury Nepean River to prevent nutrients in farm run-off from reaching the river.

In Autumn numbers of our group took part in the Autumn Bug Survey for the Water Board. We found that a stormwater drain that empties into *our* stream reduces the water quality from fair to poor. Two students attended the Hornsby Council's Environment Youth Forum which provided some new ideas to think about for the future.



She smiled and glided toward to him, then stopped. Her face twisted into a frown. She started drifting slowly away from him.


Joe clambered up. His stiff joints popped. He took one step, two steps towards her. She kept backing away, and he kept following, unconscious of anything but her.

How ironic that the one with the least to gain from living is the only one who survived. What am I, without the love and guidance from the only family that I have ever known and loved? I could never bear the thought of losing one of them and the punishment that I never felt I deserved. My only consolation is that they do not feel the pain I feel now, have felt and will feel for what is left of my life.

I have been seen by many experts on psychology and none can fathom my inexplicable reaction to my family's tragic death. They can only reach one conclusion and that is that I chose it myself and I did. There has never been a medical case such as mine in the history of their records. They never tried to find a reason or a cure for my benefit, to ease my suffering, they only wanted me to replay the gory details of that cool, winter afternoon. I will not succumb to their interrogations. I hold the key to the accident that stunned and reached the heart of the nation. I remember the headlines, "11 YEAR OLD GIRL ORPHANED IN MYSTERIOUS CAR CRASH". It wasn't a mystery to me. I saw the lights flash in my fathers eyes as the car came careering towards us. I saw the slime that drove the car and I remember the gleam in his eyes and the smile on his face as he swerved the car into our path. I know and understand that he was intending to kill himself, but why take my family as well? They had done nothing to deserve that horrible death. My salvation arrives and the letter is placed where Lydia will see it. The smile that I'll see on my face, will be a smile of relief. Finally after ten long years of grieving and nightmares, I will be free. When the knife slides down the wrist, I'll feel a tingle of joy, as I know soon I will be reunited with my only loves. Tears of absolute ecstasy will be coursing down my damaged skin. I won't feel the pain that is supposed to accompany my drastic actions. Tears and joy and my family approaching. I train six days a week and compete on various weekends, usually every third weekend.


How do your parents feel about your sport and do they support you all the way?


Both are very supportive, especially Mum who drives me around to all the classes and competitions, and puts up with my nonsense(Thanks Mum).
