PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

2004 has been a year of celebration of our tradition, of our growth and of our community at Mount St. Benedict. Symbolically capturing each of these aspects is the beautiful stained glass window at the top of the central stairwell, the state-of-the-art Administration and TAS buildings with the refurbished areas and the exquisite sculpture that graces our front entrance. For each of us in the immediate and extended family of Bennies there is a genuine sense of pride in our development and a humble recognition of the support given to us from many and varied quarters. In this, my final report, I would like to take the opportunity to explore the story I have been privileged to share with you.

A young school, the story of our genesis with the wonderful vision of the Sisters of the Good Samaritan of the Order of St Benedict intrinsically connected us to what we now know as the Mount St Benedict Centre. In 1966, Mount St Benedict High School opened in the basement and laundry of the Good Samaritan Novitiate. At the heart of the Novitiate is the Chapel with its beautiful stained glass windows. Here our Development Officer gained inspiration for the window we wished to create for the College. In 1998 under the Principalship of Mr Alan Moran, the College Mission and Vision Statement was written. It beautifully expressed the core values of our shared endeavours at MSB.

Bringing these values together, the stained glass design was copied from one of the Chapel windows.

Central to the design is the cross from our College emblem along with the flame signifying the outreach we promote with our core values. In 2004, as the building works were coming to completion, the window was positioned at the top of the central stairway of the original school building to celebrate our beginnings and connect us to the present and beyond.

Six years ago when I arrived at Mount St Benedict, the College Board was clear in its view that the buildings of the College were ready for further development, and that there was a necessity for extension due to our increasing enrolment. Consultation with the whole community was undertaken by Laszlo Sloboslay and Bill Lovelock of the Glendenning Group and the dream for the buildings became a reality. This occurred at a time of great uncertainty as government funding was changing at both Commonwealth and State levels. The commitment and dedication of the College Board was never more evident. In a courageous decision the Board, under the Chair of Mr Roger Hook, signed off on the Building programme and for all of us the excitement rose. Whilst our temporary accommodation was "interesting" and "inventive", there was a genuine sense of adventure. Mr Nigel Quamby, the Chair of the Building and Land Development Sub-Committee of the Board, was tenacious in his approach to the project and dogged in his determination to supervise every detail. Assisted in the later stages by fellow Directors, Mr Karl Henry and Mr Stephen Janson, Nigel's effort was monumental and we are most grateful to him. At the school end, Mr Peter Sultana, our Business Manager, was the de facto Project

Manager. Equally, his attention to every detail was evident everywhere and I pay tribute to Peter and thank him for the support he gave to our builders, Coleman and Fairburn.

The strength of the bond in our community was clearly evident over those years. Parent support was unstinting, staff and student support was constant in encouragement and flexible adaptation, and support from the Sisters was ever present. The expression of community so beautifully represented by the sculptor, Mrs Pauline Clayton, is what makes Mount St Benedict so special. Relationships within the community are central to our understanding of Pax, Hospitality and Stewardship. These words, these concepts, have a lived expression in our community. For the Parents & Friends, the Mount St Benedict Ex-Students Association, the Board, Staff and Students, they inform our actions and nurture our spirit.

In moving from Mount St Benedict, I take with me wonderful memories of the community, you who have touched my heart.

Thank you for allowing me to share the journey with you. I pray for God's blessing on you all. As you welcome Mrs Maria Pearson may she, too, experience the spirit of MSB.

REPORT FROM THE BOARD

The Board has had another very active year with the main focus on the continuing development of the College to meet current and future student needs.

At the start of the year, the Board and College Leadership team met to develop the College's Strategic Plan which covers the next four-year period. This has set a benchmark which will be used by both the College and the Board as we move forward with confidence into the future.

The year has seen the official opening by Bishop David Walker of the \$5.6 million building upgrade program. The new facilities have provided the College with nine extra classrooms, a new laboratory, and new TAS rooms to replace the refurbished existing rooms and additional administration facilities, as well as upgraded staff accommodation.

In addition, we saw the 'dancing into life' of the new bronze sculpture by Pauline Clayton, showing three figures representing the aspects of Benedictine spirituality that underpin the College community values.

STAFF

We have seen the departure of our Principal, Helen Sinclair, and the Board wishes to recognise the significant contribution she has made to the College. We wish her well in her new position in Brisbane.

The Board was pleased to announce the appointment of Maria Pearson, who will take over as Principal from the start of the 2005 school year. She will continue in the strategic development of the College within the community and within the context of the wider Church community.

Mrs Sue Lennox has taken over as Acting Principal during the fourth term and the Board wishes to thank her for her continuing support.

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT

The Higher School Certificate results in 2003 were very favourable confirmation of the College's high standards of teaching and the full implementation of the curriculum. In the 38 courses studied by students at MSB, 27 courses had course means above the State average. MSB students appeared on 51 occasions in the Board of Studies "Distinguished Achievers" listing in 16 different courses. These results show a continuing improvement over the previous year.

These broad ranging results reflect the motivation of the students, the support and encouragement from their families, and the dedication of the teachers and support staff at Mount St Benedict College.

CO-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Students continue to participate and excel in community activities, including debating and public speaking. They are very well represented in the sporting arena with success in many areas too numerous to mention. Students participated in a number of overseas trips to countries including Peru, Germany, Noumea and Hawaii.

The Social Justice Group has become a vital and integral part of the College's life. This year over 200 students attended the annual Social Justice Forum with representatives attending from many local schools. The keynote speaker was Fr. Chris Riley from Youth Off The Streets.

PARENTS AND FRIENDS & EX-STUDENTS

The P&F had a busy year contributing to the operations of the College. At the start of this year, the P&F hosted the welcome BBQ for the new students and their parents. Other fundraising activities included the Trivia Night, as well as looking after the uniform shop. The Parent Support Network has been well supported during the year, providing assistance to a number of families in need.

The Ex Students Association again hosted the 'Beyond Bennies' evening that brought back to the College ex-students representing the past four decades. A number of presenters looked at their journeys from school to the present, discussing the balance in life between career, relationships and spirituality.

Finally, I would like to thank the Board, the Principal, the Executive, the staff and the student body for their diligence and dedication in support of the College during an extremely busy and

BUSINESS MANAGER'S REPORT

This certainly has been a tumultuous year of building for the College. Frustration, excitement and finally celebration could equally describe feelings towards our buildings in 2005.

As foreshadowed in our 2003 Year Book, the beginning of this year certainly had its fair share of disruption. In spite of tremendous efforts by builders, architects and College staff, the Administration building was not ready for occupation by the beginning of the school year. The Technology building had been handed over in December of 2003, but without the Administration building, temporary office spaces occupied by over 20 people could not be handed back as classrooms. In addition, teaching staff had packed away their resources prior to the Christmas break in readiness for occupation of the Administration building. Consequently, with an incomplete building, staff had to endure the frustration of not being able to prepare for the school year.

Plan B was hurriedly put into place. All students, except for Year 12, were asked to delay commencement of the school year by two days. The IRC (Information Resource Centre, formerly Library) was occupied as temporary offices and closed to students for two weeks. The patience of many people was certainly put to the test. I must take this opportunity to express my deep appreciation to all teaching staff, IRC staff and support staff who put up with difficult conditions to ensure disruptions to students were kept to a minimum. The girls' needs were always paramount in our minds. The Maintenance team must also rate a

special mention for their enormous efforts in helping staff occupy spaces as they became available.

Frustration turned to excitement as our sculpture arrived and was installed. The sculpture was "danced into life" in a beautiful ceremony witnessed by the College community and the sculptor, Pauline Clayton. The community was encouraged to touch the sculpture daily to "give life and ponder the way of the women".

Excitement quickly became celebration as Bishop David Walker blessed our buildings. He and Sr Sonia Wagner sgs, Superior of the Sisters of the Good Samaritan of the Order of St Benedict, officially opened the buildings. The celebration was a wonderful community-building exercise. Our girls and staff were splendid in conducting tours and providing hospitality for the opening. The organising committee and the whole staff community were fabulous in preparing the College for this celebration. Our dignitaries included Bishop Walker, Sisters of the Order, priests from surrounding parishes, Board members, Federal and State politicians, and six out of the seven former Principals of the College. The Principals are a very special group of people who have contributed so much to shape the College and set it on a firm footing for the future, making a difference to the lives of tens of thousands of girls. The College owes a great debt to them and in return they were lavish in their praise of what the College represents in 2004. However, it was the attendance of current and former students, their parents and families, and staff, both current and former, that made this day a key highlight in the life of Mount St Benedict College.

This will be my final report for the Year Book. As you read this I will be enjoying a "sea change" with my family and moving to Queensland (not Stuartholme School). I would like to take this opportunity to thank some very special people in the College community who have helped make this the most enjoyable job I have ever had. Firstly, the Leadership team: Helen Sinclair, Sue Lennox, John Muskovits and Brian Loughland. Their support in times of real difficulty was truly inspirational. Without their leadership and energy this College would not be the extraordinary place it is for Catholic holistic education. The finance team is a group of dedicated women who have shown extraordinary patience to endure a demanding boss. The administration staff shows dedication to service for others, which is truly Christian and a perfect model for our students. The maintenance team is a group of men who work tirelessly in the background to make the delivery of education as seamless as possible. The support staff in the IRC, Science labs and Hospitality area, is another group who exemplify our values of Pax and Hospitality. Of course, there is the teaching staff, the group of people on whose shoulders rest's the success of the College Community. Stewardship is alive and well at Mount St Benedict when it is in the hands of a wonderfully talented and dedicated group.

To the entire College community, thank you for the past five years.

BLESSING AND OPENING OF NEW COLLEGE FACILITIES

The Blessing and Opening of the new two-storey administration building, three-storey Technological and Applied Studies (TAS) building and refurbishment of many other parts of the College was held on Sunday July 25th.

Bishop of Broken Bay Diocese, The Reverend David Walker D.D., presided at Mass and opened the buildings with Father Terry O'Brien, parish priest at St Agatha's Pennant Hills and Fr David Orr OSB from the Benedictine Monastery at Arcadia. Mr Philip Ruddock (member for Berowra and Attorney General), Mr Andrew Tink (member for Epping), Nan Horne (councillor from Hornsby Council) and principals from other schools also attended the opening. It was very special that six of the seven MSB principals were able to attend the Opening along with MSBESA, the ex-students association, the Parents and Friends and staff and students.

The project was completed with the installation of a sculpture designed by Melbourne artist, Pauline Clayton. The bronze, 1.8m tall sculpture depicts three female figures standing together, looking in different directions. One supports the other referring to the call to respond compassionately to the needs of society. One gently holds a swallow, a bird often seen at the school, depicting a reverence for all of God's creation. A book under the arm of the third figure is the sacred text and shows this is a place of learning.

The students danced the statue into life in the week before the Opening. Artist Pauline Clayton had worked with students in developing the concept of the statue. She urged girls to touch and revere the work. Since its installation students have been seen detouring to touch the statue. They rub Terry the

turtle's back for good luck before an exam and place flowers in the crook of the arm.

"It feels like a brand new school and it looks so good!" said one student. Principal Helen Sinclair says, "Everyone from the Board, architects, the construction company, staff and students have worked so hard in bringing this project to such a beautiful end."

Oh, What a Year! The new buildings and the refurbished facilities were a delight to return to at the beginning of 2004. All at the College appreciated this creation that came out of the construction site we had existed in for the past year.

2004 saw the reintroduction of information nights for each Year. Many parents enjoyed the opportunity to catch up with fellow parents and gain an overview of what was happening for their daughter. Guest speakers from the Eating Disorder Foundation and the Police Service were helpful in bringing a focus to the evening.

Students' talents and achievements were once again a highlight of the year. These were celebrated in the enjoyable Assemblies, Liturgies and Presentations. Whether in the form of performances, creations or competitions, opportunities to share their achievements and talents were valued and encouraged.

As part of the Pastoral Care programme, classes worked through themes in the lessons, which focused on stress, peace, communication, friendships and conflict. The inter-house decathlon was a great opportunity for houses to gain points through a variety of activities. Most girls enjoyed a performance from Brainstorm Productions during the year and this often led to follow up work in the Assemblies. Programmes and opportunities such as Peer Support, Study Skills and RYDA (Rotary Youth Driver Awareness) gave valuable support in addressing specific needs in specific year groups. "Chill Out" and "Anxiety Workshops" offered by the



counsellor gave further support to students who wanted assistance in these areas.

Dances, formals and harbour cruises once again gave girls an opportunity to 'frock up' and enjoy a little social time. In addition to the benefits of meeting new people and enjoying new environments, on some occasions money was raised for the St Vincent de Paul Society.

Student Leadership continues to be a great strength of the College. The new captains have jumped at the chance to take rein of the different areas in the College and lead us into new experiences. The Mini Olympics, dance parties in the hall and Carols on the Mount have been great events that have demonstrated the captains' willingness to work for their school.

The Pastoral Care Evaluation, conducted throughout the second semester, gathered information from students, staff, parents and ex-students. Its final report highlighted our strengths and made recommendations in the areas of weakness. Overwhelmingly

all stakeholders value the vertical homeroom and recognise the great benefits that come with the variety of ages in one group. Through 2005 we will work at putting in place the structures and programmes to address the weak areas so that for 2006 we have a more comprehensive Pastoral Care Programme that ensures that all girls are supported, known, acknowledged and cared for without exception.

Finally, to farewell Mrs Sinclair at the end of Term 3 was a real loss. Many in our community have been touched by her sincerity and care for the girls. As a strong advocate of the Pastoral Care needs of the girls she will be greatly missed. She is truly an inspiring woman.

Thank you to our mentors, to the girls and we wish the best of luck to the new Social Justice team. Cheers!



 Hills Hornets.




- Sylvia Usien represented Sydney Polish Dancing Folkloric Group in Canberra

The History/Geography excursion started us off for the year. Half of the year group went to Macquarie University for History. It was a great fun way to learn more and we did


lots of hands-on work like looking at mummies and artifacts from Greece.



And like St Benedict (who is an authentic role model of faith, prayer and hard work)




May we respond fully to the call of the Gospel (with heart, mind and soul)

MSB Day concluded with the traditional talent quest where students again unleashed their talent and humour with energy and high spirits.








This excerpt from the Values for a Learning Community Conference can be no better illustrated than by the Curriculum Review which will begin in early 2005. The Review, facilitated by an external consultant, will seek advice from the major stakeholders of the College - parents, teachers and students with the recommendations implemented from 2006.

It is my belief that the College is at a watershed with a marvellous opportunity to really take learning forward into the 21st century.

Much preparatory work has been done this year through the development of a number of curriculum policies. The Teaching and Learning Policy, the first for the College, is an attempt to integrate the Good Samaritan ethos with the latest in educational research. The Gifted and Talented and Learning Support Policies acknowledge a need to recognise and respond to

the many differing needs of our students. No longer is it acceptable to teach to the middle.

To this end the College has used some of the QTP (Quality Teacher Programmes) funds it has successfully applied for to professionally develop teachers in curriculum differentiation. Mrs Estelle Lewis, a consultant for the AIS (Association of Independent Schools), has been working with faculties in developing an action research model which asks teachers to plan, implement and review either differentiated teaching strategies or assessment tasks. Some student work samples collected to date have been very impressive and encouraging for the future.

A number of Parent Information evenings were also held during the year giving parents an opportunity to understand the many aspects of curriculum such as the Standards Referenced model with its implications for assessment and reporting.

The College has also been hard at work in developing clear roles and responsibilities for the Faculty Coordinators and teachers. It is hoped that this will facilitate even clearer accountability and communication between parents and the College.

On a human resource level,
Ms Jackie Duncan accepted the
position of Coordinator of Teaching
and Learning. Ms Duncan's key
focus this year has been to identify
students who are gifted and talented
and very able and to develop
scaffolds for these and other students
by embedding higher order thinking
skills into the Year 7 programmes.
Working with Ms Duncan and

Mrs Sharon McGowan, the IRC Coordinator, it is my intention to map Information Literacy, Information Communication Technology (ICT) and higher order thinking skills across stage 4 (Yrs 7 and 8) by next year. This will give the girls a solid grounding for their eventual preparation for external exams in Yr 10 and probably in Yr 12.

Mrs Eileen Kelly and
Mrs Sue Gadiel have been
working in developing support
for students who have learning
difficulties. The Faculty
Coordinators have been spending
many hours preparing their staff
for the new syllabuses which will
be implemented in 2005.

This year has indeed been a time when the Mission and Vision statement of life long learning has been lived out. There is much more to be done. In fact the real work is about to begin on reconceptualising and rebuilding many of the educational structures we have held sacrosanct for a long time.

We live in exciting times as we hold onto what is good and jettison what is no longer valuable.

Mrs de Launey was as enthusiastic about her junior classes – sharing the co-ordination of the Spellathon, and running the final in the hall – as she was about her seniors – preparing students for the HSC and looking forward to taking the Extension classes into 2005. As one of her students has so accurately put it:

Mrs de Launey... A woman deeply loved, with high values that were reflected in her teaching. Almost every day she would include little anecdotes about her family. Her values were expressed in her friendships with her colleagues and her girls. Her kind warmness and dedication will be sadly missed.

The English Department has also been enriched by the addition of Mrs Fran Cunningham and Ms Gabrielle Fonteyne who joined us at the beginning of the year.

One of the great achievements of 2004 was the Year 7 Spellathon, organised by Mrs de Launey and Mr Loughland. Students and staff responded eagerly to the challenge and the girls made an impressive effort to hone their spelling and vocabulary skills. After preliminary rounds were conducted at class level, sixteen finalists emerged to take part in the Spell-off during Friday lunchtime. This event was very exciting and attracted not only Year 7 students as audience, but seniors and others. We all witnessed an amazing competition which included words such as "surreptitious" and "pachyderm". PDHPE REPORT

The ever-changing PDHPE faculty has a new look again! In 2004 Mrs Dianne Mills joined the faculty in a job share role and Mrs Michele Busuttil joined us in a full-time position. Sadly, we farewelled Mrs Belinda Edwards at the end of Term 3 and we wish her well as she embarks on a new career pathway.

2004 saw the last of the Personal Development/Health/Physical Education curriculum that has been taught since the early 90s. Year 7 attended Swim School at the Sydney Aquatic Centre. Year 8 attended Surf Educate at Manly Beach to broaden their skills and knowledge of water safety. Year 8 participated in a series of soccer clinics to fine-tune skills and increase their enjoyment of physical activity with former Socceroo and Australian Captain Paul Wade.

Year 9 completed their introductory First Aid course with Medixcare to equip them with essential life saving skills and knowledge of emergency care procedures. Year 9 took part in a series of self-defence classes during practical lessons to enhance awareness of their personal safety. A series of AFL clinics helped Year 10 improve their foot-eye co-ordination. They participated in the Brett Sanders workshop for self-protection. Both years improved their co-ordination by participating in a series of dance workshops and visiting community recreational venues.

Year 11 PDHPE attended a two-day outdoor recreation expedition in the Blue Mountains to complete their study of the great outdoors. They participated in a variety of activities including bushwalking, mountain biking, tent craft, map reading and orienteering. Year 12 attended Sydney University for a day, utilising the gym and exercise lab facilities for valuable

practical application of their core studies. Year 11 Exploring Early Childhood examined the needs of both parents and young children in the modern world with a very practical "hands on" focus to their course. The girls attended numerous community childcare centres and interacted with staff and children. They visited the maternity ward of Westmead Hospital and took part in bathing, feeding and massaging demonstrations and general care of young children.

The Sport Science elective in Year 9/10 continued to grow and develop as a popular course of study. Year 9 designed sporting competition draws and assisted at the College Swimming Carnival as officials. They participated in a battery of fitness tests and analysed their results and attended local fitness clubs to explore fitness options. A highlight was the overnight outdoor adventure at "The Basin" campsite in Pittwater where the focus was self-survival in the aquatic environment. Manly Surf School with body boarding, surfing and water survival skills were popular camp activities. Year 10 developed their coaching skills, examined Australian sporting history, analysed the diet needed for optimal sporting performance and discovered basic sport massage techniques. A highlight was the two-day outdoor recreation experience to Perisher Blue to ski.

Here are a few things that we had to say about our trip:





Congratulations to Senior Students on their very commendable HSC results.







IRC (INFORMATION RESOURCE CENTRE)

The year began for the Information Resource Centre (IRC) in a state of confusion. We had 'visitors' throughout the building, as the lower section of the new Administration building was not ready for occupation. Once the 'visitors' were able to depart a transformation occurred with new tables, chairs, computers, reference and periodical shelving installed thanks to a generous donation from the Parents and Friends Association. Once the girls were able to enter the building their surprise and enthusiasm for the new layout and furniture were wonderful to see.

Information literacy has become a focus of the IRC's activities in 2004. Having a computer area with twenty one computers, and ceiling-installed data projector and screen has enabled students to see clearly what resources are available to be used and how to use them effectively to complete research tasks. Throughout the year there has been an obvious increase in the use of the College intranet and information services available via the intranet and the computer area is booked on average 5 of 6 periods each day.

Throughout the year the IRC has also been host to a number of events including author talks by JC Burke and Sophie Masson, a guest speaker from the MS Society to discuss the MS Read-a-thon at a Year 7 assembly and an Education Officer from the Sydney Morning Herald to discuss the use of newspapers to support Senior studies.

During August, Children's Book Week was celebrated with the theme this year 'Doorways'. All English classes from Yrs 7 to 10 had the opportunity to explore the IRC's sixteen doorways (created collectively by IRC staff) and learn about competitions which applied to each doorway. Year 7 also participated in an activity where they wrote a Book Review and then presented their review behind a Doorway. Over ninety Book Reviews were completed and these were used to decorate the windows of the IRC. Both activities resulted in a number of students being invited to a Book Week Morning Tea with the IRC and English staff to acknowledge the effort they had displayed in creating their entries.

INFORMATION AND COMMUNICATION TECHNOLOGY (ICT)

I am writing this report while monitoring the twenty-five self-motivated, enthusiastic students using the TypeQuick Course in one of our new computer rooms C311. 2004 has seen many changes and improvements in the College.

In the 2003 - 2004 Christmas holidays you would see Mrs Hickey and myself in running shoes and casual clothes moving around the College installing the 87 desktops and 44 laptops, setting up the two new computer rooms C311 and B203 with new computers and desks. We upgraded the computers in the IRC and installed fourteen computers and desks into B201 in the new TAS Block.

All staff members now have a laptop accessing the network and Internet at their work desk.

What a busy time we had. The installation was not completed until mid Term One. The Science Department have been working on their new class set of wireless lap tops and students are often seen wheeling the laptop trolleys from Lab 3 to Lab 1. Who would believe they would be used to this extent.

The girls are really enjoying the freedom of 'any time, anywhere' learning. As I mentioned the laptops are wireless-ready and in 2005 you will see the emergence of wireless access points in the Science Labs and the top floor of B Block (New TAS Building).

The College Network was doubled during the Christmas holidays. The new TAS Block, the Chapel, Senior Area and C Block Classrooms, all have network access available and all computers run Windows XP. Included in the refurbishing of the IRC, Chapel and Senior areas was the installation of the LCD projectors and sound systems. Along with laptops the new DVD/VCR combo units run to the projectors. Staff have enjoyed not having to carry all video equipment across the College to use in lessons. The IRC teaching space is always booked out to classes enjoying the benefits of a visual demonstration on computer before commencing a learning task.

I believe one of the best improvements in 2004 was the updating of the College Intranet site. The Daily notices and MSB Notes are readily available to staff and students over the Internet from home or College. Homework sheets are beginning to be posted under the Subject area for the students to access from home as well as the College. Reports indicate that more than 80% of students are accessing the Intranet each week. Continual upgrading of the Intranet will continue over 2005.

Marisa bought her very first bandanna for CanTeen in 1997 when she was in Year 7 at Bennies. Little did she realise that she would be buying for herself one day. She said "2002 was a big year for me on many levels. It was the year I did my HSC, got to use the senior common room (exciting stuff!), the year I had my formal, and the year I was diagnosed with cancer. In October 2002, three weeks before I was due to sit my HSC, I was diagnosed with Hodgkin's Disease, a form of Lymphatic Cancer".

Between studying for exams, Marisa was undergoing numerous tests for cancer. She did her HSC, went to the Yr 12 formal and went straight into six months of treatment. She struggled with uncontrollable nausea and lost all her long blond hair but, ironically, still managed to cop all the blonde jokes from her friends! She would have treatment once every two weeks for six months, followed by radiotherapy for five days a week for five weeks. She lost her sense of taste for a month and was burned badly externally and internally. Nevertheless, she dealt with it positively and was determined not to give up without a fight. This was also when she joined CanTeen.

She said "I remember seeing a brochure at the hospital and

thought of my days at Bennies, buying bandannas every year, and thought well, why shouldn't I join? I went to my first CanTeen outing in November 2003 and saw The Lion King on stage. It was great to get involved with this fantastic organisation, and I decided to go to summer camp in January 2004. That week would change my life."

"At summer camp we did numerous activities — everything from surfing to thong painting. I got to express my thoughts and emotions through discussion groups with other patients. I found that at CanTeen I was given all the support, understanding and comfort I needed but could not always receive from others. I also gained insight into what siblings and offspring may feel, instead of just seeing it from a patient's perspective."

"I am now in remission and getting better as each day goes by. But at times the road to recovery can be a long and difficult one, as it can take years for a cancer patient in remission to get back on their feet again. Regular check-ups are daunting with old feelings revisited, the sights and sounds of the oncology clinic and silly doubts entering your thoughts."

Marisa is taking it day by day. Having cancer is a life-changing journey, and she is so grateful to be living life because she knows others have not been as fortunate. With the wonderful CanTeen experiences, her CanTeen friends, and with the support of this fantastic organisation she can look forward to a brighter, positive cancer-free future.

PROJECT COMPASSION

SOCIAL JUSTICE FORUM



MISSION WEEK


In November, during Mission Week, we celebrated the work of Catholic Missions. They provide opportunities for education and the spreading of the Gospel to children in developing countries.

DROPZONE, LIFT, TWILIGHT RETREAT AND LUNCHTIME MASSES


Additional opportunities are offered within the daily routine of school life to take some time out for games, reflection and prayer.

Dropzone is a lunchtime games program for junior students that Mrs Gosden and Mrs Barnett have took on in 2004.


Lift is a lunchtime chat and prayer session for senior students offered occasionally throughout the year by Mrs Bonser and Mr Smith.







also selected and was the youngest player in the team. They competed in Europe where her team was very successful and moved up a Division.


This year the Australian National Women's Team competed in the IIHF Division II World Women's Championships. The Championships were held in Italy from 14 March to 20 March 2004.


HOLLY POBJIE

Michelle Sims of Year 8 was selected for the National Performing Group of twenty students who toured the Gold Coast and Byron Bay in October.






AMANDA DIDIO



The girls said, "Throughout the years at Mount St Benedict we


have been very successful in the competition of 'Tournament of Minds', affectionately known as just Tournament.

IT'S NOT EASY BEING ME

Remember the TV show 3rd Rock From the Sun? where John Lithgow plays a clueless alien who comes to earth and tries to learn how to socialize with the earth people but he always ends up making a complete idiot of himself? Like the aliens from 3rd Rock, I too have problems with people. This is going to be somewhat of a surprise, but I, Elise Bottle, am autistic.

I know that the autistic kids you see on TV have almost no chance in the world of being able to get on stage and speak a single intelligible sentence without fumbling, let alone a six-minute speech. The truth is that the word "autism" is a generalization of disorders with similar symptoms. Those poor kids you see on TV have a more serious kind of autism where their ability to communicate with and respond to others is severely impaired. My kind of autism is specifically known as Asperger's Syndrome. Asperger's Syndrome makes me seems like a 'normal' person, until someone talks to me.

Eye contact, for instance, is a huge task for me. People may think that I am uninterested in the topic, or that I'm simply being rude. It's hard for me now trying to look at all of you without giving the "shifty eye" look as explained in the public speaking video we watched in English before starting this assignment.

I am unable to read social cues and hidden meaning. For example, if somebody were to say "nice hat" in a sarcastic manner, I would miss the sarcasm and think the person meant it as a genuine complement. Or, I will keep blabbing on about a subject even though the person whom I am talking to has subtly hinted for me to "shut up". To say the least, conversations with me can end up being one-sided.

I have an unnatural failure to develop peer relationships. I was never interested in making many friends as a child. I only had one close friend, and as far as I was concerned that was all I needed. I never saw any problem with it. When I'm anxious or excited, I tend to rock in my seat. Sometimes when I'm really tense I've had people come and tell me

that the way I rock is making them seasick!

I suffer excessive anxiety in situations most people handle with ease. I can get extremely anxious when in a new situation. For example, at the year 10 graduation ceremony last year, a friend of mine tried to introduce me to a man she knew. Next thing you know, I'm hyperventilating. A cup of water and a string of apologies later I'm back to normal.

Another thing that sets me apart from "normal" people is my choice of entertainment. While most people choose shows such as *Passions* or read books such as Harry Potter, I'd rather be reading the latest edition of Encarta or watching Walking with Dinosaurs. There are exceptions but the bottom line here is that I find non-fiction more fascinating than the latest movie. A good term for me, and people like me, is "walking encyclopaedia".

I am also somewhat hypersensitive to loud background noises, which makes riding the bus to and from school very frustrating for me. Some of the girls in my grade may remember me screaming out to them to shut up in class. The truth was that the noise level was giving me a headache. I'm not saying that my problem was their fault; I just would like to explain to them my weird behaviour and to apologise for it.

There are many more symptoms associated with Asperger's Syndrome but basically, it's a mild form of autism with a dash of obsessive-compulsive disorder, and a sprinkle of agoraphobia for good measure. Public speaking is hard for all of us. But for me, it is especially frustrating because I lack the basic skills needed for everyday communication, such as body language, empathy and reading of hidden social cues. People could use the term "neurotic geek" to describe me — and personally I think that description fits, although my mum would disagree.

Some of you may or may not have heard of AS before. My parents didn't know what it was until five years ago. The syndrome is named after Viennese doctor Hans Asperger who, back in the 1940s, studied a small group of boys who seemed to show unusual social, linguistic and thinking patterns. It was

not until the 80s, however, that his studies were taken seriously, and Asperger's Syndrome gained any acknowledgment.

Mum knew from the day I was born, there was something different about me. People thought that the problem was with her. But mum knew that there was something not quite right, something she just couldn't put her finger on.

In my early primary school years, I was conned into doing some pretty stupid things by the older kids - I was a pretty gullible kid. When I reached the later years of primary school, all of the other were moving into their little "friendship groups", while I preferred to play my own imaginary games than do what other kids wanted me to do. I was misdiagnosed as having ADD and was immediately prescribed Ritalin. Naturally, as ADD wasn't the problem, the medication didn't work. I still don't really understand those early years - the most I can remember is either crazy mood swings or doing something to embarrass myself for years to come.

It wasn't until year six, also known as the most traumatising year of my life, that I was finally diagnosed with AS. It took 12 years and a trip to Queensland to figure out what was wrong with me! But, boy, did that session explain a lot of things.

Most teenage girls are into boys, fashion and the latest music. Not me. I'm not trendy. I'm not "in". I don't rush to the TV every night to find out the latest plot twist in Neighbours. I don't read Dolly magazine. I don't have a major crush on Brad Pitt or envy J-Lo's figure. The truth is, I have never been cool. Ever. I never knew, even at primary school, what every one else was watching on telly or what new toy was the most popular. And I didn't really want to know, either. Asperger's Syndrome is the reason that I'm "out" and not "in". And I can't change it.

But according to Mum, I'm getting better every day. I'm learning to think before I speak, and to consider how other people feel. It's been a long, hard road, but I'm getting there. I'm getting there.


